Dear Mr. Ambassador:

I am in receipt of your recent correspondence on your Government's decision to abolish the repressive pass laws. I hope, as you declare, that this decision will lead to "the removal of all racially descriminatory legislation from South Africa's statute books."

However, I am disturbed by reports that racial classification will persist in the substitute form of identity
documents which indicate race. Obviously, the use of such
a system of identification cards coundcontinue the basic evil
of the pass laws through a process of discriminatory enforcement.

I hope that this will not be the case, and that your Government will forthrightly address the fundamental demands of the oppressed Black majority in South Africa.
