UPDATE

H. R. 1460, THE ANTI-APARTHEID ACT OF 1985

Dear Friend:

Now is the critical time for you to escalate your involvement in the Free South Africa Movement. Together, we can help forge an important new beginning in the effort to root out the evil of apartheid.

This week, Congress will reconvene, and the Senate will consider the House/Senate Conference Report on H.R. 1460, the Anti-Apartheid Act of 1985. Because of your help in the past, in early August, the House passed the Conference Report by an overwhelming vote of 380 to 48. We must now urge the Senate to follow the lead of the House, and we must insure that a Presidential veto, if it occurs, can be overridden.


Beginning September 9, 1985, there may be various activities in your state aimed at encouraging your Senators to vote for the Conference Report. You may wish to participate in these activities, and it is your right to do so under the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Should you choose to participate, special attention should be directed towards those Senators who are in the "swing category" on the target list included on the reverse side of this letter for your use.

The Conference Report on H.R. 1460 would ban bank loans, the importation of Krugerrands, and the sale of computer and nuclear technology to the South African Government. In addition, the bill calls for an end to new private investment in South Africa if it fails to make progress toward ending apartheid.

The House vote came on the last day before the Congress adjourned for a month-long recess. However, Senate action on the Conference Report was delayed because of a threatened filibuster by eight Senators led by Sen. Jesse Helms.

Recent actions by the government of South Africa clearly demonstrate that the United States must undertake a more effective policy in its relations with South Africa. We must not quit until our government responds to our legitimate appeal.
