OUNDATION Message from the Ionorary ALC Chairman

> honor to welcome you to the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation's 27th Annual Legislative Conference. Since its beginning, the Conference has brought together African American leaders from across the country—elected officials, community activists, government appointees and grassroots workers. The participants represent all walks of life—from great urban centers in New York and California, to rural hamlets and towns in Mississippi and South Carolina. This year's theme, "Leadership Dimensions for the New Millennium," emphasizes the urgent need for us to fortify ourselves for the challenges we are destined to face in the 21st century.

This has been an extraordinary year. We have celebrated the 50th anniversary of Jackie Robinson desegregating major league baseball. We have seen athletes of color achieve extraordinary levels of professional and economic visibility and success. The Michael Jordans and the Tiger Woods of the world have established new levels of excellence in their fields. But we misspeak and mislead if we suggest that Michael Jordan and Tiger Woods represent the transcendence of economic equity and professional liberty in our society today. They do not. For all the doors that may have been opened in fields such as athletics, entertainment and even politics, other doors are being narrowed or even closed at the same time.

Over the last few years, there has been an all-out assault on affirmative action programs and we have experienced disturbing reports of discriminatory practices at some of our nation's best-known corporations. Several states have passed anti-affirmative action laws, and as a result, some of our most prestigious public universities will enroll few, and in some instances, no African American students in their professional schools this fall. And yes, there is even legislation in Congress that would, if made into law, prohibit any form of affirmative action in the federal government.

But such contradictions and contrasts are not new. A century ago, African Americans were voting and being elected to public office throughout the country, and in a matter of a few years, those rights and responsibilities were taken away by poll taxes, literacy tests and other policies and practices that diluted black voting power and relegated people of color to almost a century of second-class citizenship.Today, we seem to be experiencing what Yogi Berra might describe as, "Deja vu all over again".

The profile of the average American in the twenty-first century will include diverse racial and ethnic distinctions more prominently than ever before—African

American, Asian American, Hispanic American, Anglo American, Native American and so on. We must be prepared for an increasingly competitive and contentious society. As leaders, we must be ready and we must train new and younger generations of leaders who value the rights we hold dear.

Thank you for your support of our 27th Annual Legislative Conference and for your sustaining commitment over these many years.

Each year, the ALC allows the members of the CBC, primarily through the Braintrusts and Issue Forums, the opportunity to interact with the people we serve. It also allows us the chance to educate and inform our constituents about the legislative and public policy issues we grapple with each day in Congress.

In the 105th Congress, the CBC has developed an agenda and legislative initiatives to protect the hard fought gains that people of color and women have made over the past 30 years and to provide access to opportunities for all citizens. African Americans are painfully aware of the role that race plays in the daily decisions of American institutions. Last June, the President of the United States established an Advisory Board on Race and charged them with the responsibility of developing a dialogue on race and race relations.

While there has always been a discussion on race in America, it has often been within one's own race; whites with whites, blacks with blacks. Black parents explain racism to their children at an early age. They are painfully aware that their very ability to earn a living, to have access to equal education, to own a business, to obtain a home loan, to have a clean living environment and adequate health care are far too often based on decisions made by whites for blacks. And far too many of these decision-makers believe that blacks are inherently inferior, and, therefore, less deserving.

There is a dialogue about race that goes on within the white community on a daily basis that is rarely overheard by blacks. Those discussions are publicly revealed by actions taken by whites that are invariably detrimental to blacks. The recent brutal attack on a Haitian immigrant in New York, the beheading of a black veteran in Virginia and the murder of a black couple by white soldiers from Fort Bragg are horrific examples. The recent use of racial epithets and revelations by some of American's top corporate managers also reveal deep-seated racial problems.

This Town Hall meeting and Plenary Session will address the issue of race and race relations in a forthright, no holds barred, open and hard-hitting discussion. We will not cottle or protect our friends in this discussion, nor will we fear our enemies. This session will set the tone for determining efforts on behalf of black leadership to identify, define, and deal with race, discrimination, marginalization and racism.

In 1988, the CBC Spouses established the CBC Spouses Educational Scholarship Fund to provide financial resources to enable young people to obtain the skills and education needed to succeed. In nine years, the CBC Spouses Educational Scholarship Fund has contributed more than \$2.5 million in scholarships to students around the country. The CBC Spouses also are responsible for establishing the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation Fellowship Program in 1976. The goals of the CBCF Fellows Program are to offer talented men and women the opportunity to work on Congressional Committees and learn all aspects of the legislative process and to provide scholarly research on critical issues before Congress.


